A feature in the "Allegory of the War in Song," which is to be given for the benefit of the Grant Monument fund at the Madison Square Garden, is the "Centennial Overture," the introduction, with a large orchestra, military band, and a military corps, of the "Ceremony of the Centennial Anniversary Overture," by S. G. Pratt, composed and dedicated to Gen. Grant and performed at the opening of the Centennial Exposition on the occasion of his visit there in 1877. Berthold Tischbirek, conductor, will direct the orchestra. The "Centennial Overture" is a grandly-conceived work full of striking originality, masterly handling of instrumentation, and especially as regards its imposing orchestral effects. The overture was well received at its first performance, and received with great favor by the critics.
